### Why Magister?

*Magister* is a Latin word which can mean a rabbi, teacher, master, or the pilot of a ship. It brings to mind first of all One who was called "Rabbi", "Teacher", and "Master": Jesus Christ. *Magister* was also the title most commonly given to St. Gilbert of Sempringham as the first Master, or *Magister*, of the Gilbertine Order. Finally, the word *magister* pays homage to St. John Henry Newman, that great teacher in the Anglican Catholic patrimony, and to all the great teachers of the Faith through the centuries. Truly, as Newman himself wrote in the introduction to *The Idea of a University*, "[w]e have a goodly inheritance."

*Magister* is intended to be both a bulletin and a devotional, published several times a year in preparation for the Ember Days, for the benefactors of the Gilbertine Institute, Gilbertine Academy and Holy House; to communicate by prayer and supplication, to provide news with thanksgiving, so that we may make our requests known unto God (cf. *Philippians 4:6*).

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This has been a marvellous year thus far for Holy House and the Gilbertine Academy. I've had the joyful opportunity to teach art for the High School students twice a week and I love it. The halls are lively, Mass is beautiful; I'm so very proud of our children and what they are accomplishing together. As I think about these things, especially when I consider the worldly influences that seek to destroy, I wonder what it is that we are seeking for our young people as we prepare them for their adult lives.

A word that is coming up again and again for me is 'tough'. I want our children to be tough. What I mean by that is our children are growing up in a world gone mad. In a few short years, each of our students will be making their way in a world that actively opposes the Catholic world-view and Catholic morality. The most fearful part of that reality isn't that the world is a dangerous place, but rather so much of that danger is attractive. Initially anyway. We need to protect our children — yes — but more than that, we need to equip them.

One of my favourite Saints is Agnes of Rome. Perhaps twelve years old: she wanted to live her life as a Consecrated Virgin. A marriage was arranged, but "Jesus Christ is my only spouse" she would insist. She was outed as a Christian to the Roman authorities and she would be martyred for this insistence. She was beheaded on 21 January AD 304. The faithful soaked up her blood with rags, and a great Church stands even unto this day in the place of her martyrdom. I've prayed in



the presence of her little skull peeking out from a reliquary in that holy place.

St. Agnes was tough.

There are so many other examples and it seems so many were young people. What came together for them to make them as resilient and brave, as determined and as joyful and faithful as they were?

Your children will go out into the world as adults and they will be plied with riches and pleasures and promises just as Agnes was when Prefect Sempronius tried to have her marry his son. They will be cajoled and threatened just as she was when she refused to bend to the demands of the world. Will our children have what it takes to resist the powers and principalities that rule even here in Calgary?

I pray they will, because so many young people are lost. Our culture is lost. In addition to prayer, however, we need to prepare and equip our young people for the challenges they will surely face in practical and strategic ways. They must know the tricks of the devil as he sows the seeds of discord and chaos and atheism through socialism and cultural Marxism. They must know the dangers that will be alluring in only a few short years. They must be fortified in the faith, and formed and educated in such a way that they will stay true to God and His Church and to God's plans for them.

I certainly don't have the answers as to how we accomplish these things, but I am confident that we can discover them together as we grow in holiness under the patronage of our Lady and St. John.

Our children need to be strong and resilient spiritually, emotionally, physically, socially and intellectually if they are to flourish in the world laid out before them. They need to be tough. What we do at St. John's through Holy House and the Gilbertine Academy seeks to do that in concert with the families who have come to us. God guide us in this mission!

Drop down, ye heavens, from above, and let the skies pour down righteousness: let the earth open, and bring forth a Saviour (Isaiah 45:8; Psalm 19:1 - Introit for the Fourth Sunday of Advent).

Our mission in life - not just at the Gilbertine Institute - is, ultimately, cooperation with grace that is freely given to us. Our work must always have this as our ultimate guide: we teach the children good and useful things, we help them enjoy life and make friends, but ultimately we are here so that they and we will attain eternal life. This must be our final goal and omnipresent in everything we do.

### GILBERTINE ACADEMY & HOLY HOUSE CALGARY





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At least once a year I hear a derogatory comment about Holy House being in a mere church basement.

It is true. The classrooms that constitute Holy House Calgary and Edmonton are almost entirely in the basement of churches. In Calgary, the brick-and-mortar church of St. John the Evangelist was built 1911, and The Holy House of Our Lady and St. John finds sanctuary beneath the church's Sanctuary. In fact, the main hall connecting the classrooms goes directly below the tabernacle on the high altar. I often think that I ought to at least cross myself whilst walking under it. My internal debate reflects the entire point of having a school in a church basement.

It doesn't matter that Holy House in Calgary is full of windows and natural light, that each classroom is beautifully furnished with antiques and art, or that every nook and cranny is stuffed with good books. It only matters that the Lord is truly present, and that the children and staff know it, and that they grow in Him through the chanting of the daily office and Mass in the church.



In a church basement in Calgary, The Holy House of Our Lady and St. John and The Gilbertine Academy have once again doubled in enrollment this fall. If the younger siblings of current students join Holy House Calgary in the next couple of years, the enrolment will

more than double, and that does not include the near-weekly inquiries of new families. Planning is underway to start a second cohort of grade I-8 students on Mondays and Wednesdays to complement our very full and thriving cohort of Tuesday and Thursday families.

In a church basement in Sherwood Park, The Holy House of Our Lady and St. Joseph has started with tremendous success. There are only two spots left! If interest continues to increase, a possible third class will be started in Holy House Edmonton.

Why are Holy House Calgary and Edmonton growing so quickly? It is true that

the academics and staff of Holy Houses are of the highest standard, but more importantly it is because Holy House has no boundaries; that is, boundaries between the home, parish, and school. Holy House feels more like a traditional Catholic parish and home than like the local neighbourhood school. Catholic families in Alberta who attend Holy House are from every part of the globe, but because they are united in one Lord, one faith, and one baptism (Ephesians 4:5-6), they are therefore at home in one culture of peace. For the traditionally-hearted Catholic family, Holy House feels like home, where peace thrives: the peace that the world cannot give (John 14:27).


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### HOLY HOUSE Edmonton

The basement of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Parish in Sherwood Park is brimming with activity on Wednesdays this year. The parish basement has become the home of a new parentled event for home education families. The Holy House of Our Lady and St. Joseph (Holy House Edmonton) is a recognized Homeschool Event under the Gilbertine Institute, and is working towards becoming a Shared Responsibility school. Classes offered include Literature, Catechism and Church History, Music, Latin, Art, and Physical Education. Students are divided into two classes: primary (grades 1 to 3) and junior (grades 4 to 6).

The program serves Edmonton and area families, with some travelling from as far as Vegreville, Stony Plain, and Thorhild to attend. The program offers families the opportunity to take classes that aren't as easily taught at home, and have their children meet and learn with other home educated children.

Holy House Calgary has been helping guide and mentor Holy Holy Edmonton in the establishment and formation of the program. Holy House Edmonton has benefitted from the learning and experiences of Holy House Calgary, and uses many of the same resources and curriculum used by Holy House Calgary. Tutors from Holy House Calgary also teach Latin online to Edmonton students in the junior class twice a week.

Holy House Edmonton has two staff tutors and two parent-volunteer tutors leading their classes. James Rauch (B.A., B.Ed.) is the academic anchor of the Holy House Edmonton Team. He is a passionate Catholic educator and scholar who has taught in Catholic schools in the greater Edmonton area. At Holy House Edmonton he teaches Catholic Catechism, Culture and Church History, Literature, and Latin. Elizabeth Grigaitis (B.Mus.) directs the Schola Cantorum (choir classes) of Holy House Edmonton. She is an extraordinary musician and teacher who brings her deep faith and immense talent to the program. In addition to teaching private voice and piano, she has extensive experience teaching children of all ages in various settings, and has directed several Catholic choirs in Edmonton. Jessica Kassam (B.A., B.Ed.) is a parent-volunteer tutor, teaching art classes. Jessica is very skilled at drawing

inspiration from historical sources that are aligned with the time period students are studying, and integrating them into exciting art classes for her students. Jessica has a passion for art, from crossstitch to lino printmaking to paper-crafts, and loves to share this enthusiasm with her students. Damein Zakordonski is a parent-volunteer tutor teaching physical education classes. Damein is a contractor by day, and spends much of his free time cantoring for church services, working on icon carvings, and on projects with the Axios Men's Ensemble.

Families have been drawn to the program because it allows them to continue with home education, while receiving first-rate instruction at Holy House Edmonton, with a group of likeminded students. Each week, these students grow in their faith, are nurtured with classical culture, and are provided opportunities to form life-long friendships. Together, they are growing in holiness at Holy House of Our Lady and St. Joseph.

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As we enter into Advent, the time of Apreparation for Christmas, I would like to reflect on preparation within the WISDOM community.

As home education parents, we wish to prepare our children for a good life in this world, teaching them to be lifelong learners. A principal goal is to provide them with tools, knowledge, and the wisdom to use the tools and knowledge well. However, the most important thing is for our children to learn that this life is preparation for the next so that they might always keep their eye fixed on the ultimate goal: heaven.

This summer, we prepared to support our home education parents and students by developing new supports for home educating through the high school years. In addition to streamlining the high school credit process, we introduced high school specialists. These specialists both support students throughout their learning with resources and expertise for core courses, and complete final evaluations and assign credits for those courses. This service provides much desired support for those home education students who have chosen to pursue credits through high school at home.

We have continued to develop increased support and recognition for our students who have chosen to pursue a traditional home education program throughout the high school years. These include our Socratic Dialogue Online Program and assistance with parent generated transcripts.

We also prepared to serve the many new families that began their home education journey with us this fall by welcoming three new facilitators to our team. With these preparations has come a renewed sense of gratitude for the many blessings that enrich our home education community.


